February Worship at Chevy Chase United Methodist Church

(Note: Rev. Myers will be in the Holy Lands – Israel/Palestine, Jordan and Egypt – until February 10th; beginning February 20th he will begin a five-part sermon series on The Lord's Prayer.)

February 6: The Sacrament of Communion. Carol Armstrong-Moore preaching. Sermon: "You are the Light of the World," based on Matthew 5:14.

February 13: Katie Schechter preaching. Lectionary readings: Deuteronomy 30:15-20; Psalm 119:1-8; I Corinthians 3:1-9; and Matthew 5:21-37.

Five-Part Sermon Series on the Lord's Prayer

February 20: Sermon: "The Prayer of Jesus: The Double Search," based on Exodus 21:1-20 and Matthew 6:5-13. This is the first of a five-part sermon series that takes a closer look at the example of prayer that Jesus gave when His disciples asked Him how to pray.

February 27: Sermon: "The Prayer of Jesus: What on Earth is God Doing?" based on Luke 4:16-19 and Matthew 6:5-13. The petition. "Thy Kingdom come on earth as it is in heaven" should give us pause. Does God make the new realm of God come on earth; and if so, what is our compliance in making this a reality?

(Please Note: Beginning March 6th, Worship for the Traditional Service will begin at 10:00 a.m.)

March 6: Transfiguration Sunday. The Sacrament of Communion. Sermon: "The Prayer of Jesus: Give Us This Day Our Daily Bread," based on Genesis 1:26-31 and Matthew 6:5-13. In Genesis God gave humans "dominion" over the earth. That means we should act as God would care for the earth. I have travelled to some countries where the petition "give us this day our daily bread" means a prayer to have food to eat. In other countries, might this same petition be limiting – as in – give us only enough to be satisfied?

March 9: 7:00 p.m. Ash Wednesday Service, held in the Chapel. A contemplative service of prayer and introduction to Lenten Discipline.

March 13: Sermon: "The Prayer of Jesus: The Suffering of God," based on Hosea 14:1-7 and Matthew 6:5-13. True forgiveness is transforming – especially for the one doing the forgiving. In this petition of the Lord's Prayer we examine the double-sided petition, "forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us."

March 20: Sermon: "The Prayer of Jesus: Deliverance," based on Matthew 6:5-13. The last petition in the prayer that Jesus taught is "And lead us not into the time of trial, and do not put us to the test." As a student I dreaded tests – especially when I was not as prepared as I should have been. This petition, however, is not that we should live in a sterile environment where we are not tested in any way. Rather this is a petition that God not put us to the test. The petition is also that God deliver us from evil. It is hard to eradicate evil from our lives, and perhaps that is why we pray to God to be delivered from evil's ultimate power – a power that Christ's resurrection overcame.

MYERS' MUSINGS



February, 2011

But the free gift is not like the trespass. For if the many died through the one man's [Adam's] trespass, much more surely have the grace of God and the free gift in the grace of the one man, Jesus Christ, abounded for the many. And the free gift is not like the effect of the one man's sin. For the judgment following one trespass brought condemnation, but the free gift following many trespasses brings justification. If, because of the one man's trespass, death exercised dominion through that one, much more surely will those who receive the abundance of grace and the free gift of righteousness exercise dominion in life through the one man, Jesus Christ. Therefore just as one man's trespass led to condemnation for all, so one man's act of righteousness leads to justification and life for all. . . . Romans 5:15-18

A friend of mine (the Rev. Bill Trench in East Greenwich, RI) tells the story of a woman that spoke to him about his dad who had also been a minister. Bill writes:

“She told me that she belonged to a nearby Methodist church and that she was a Lay Speaker, and a leader in that church. ‘I remember your father,’ she said. ‘He was the pastor in Coventry when I was a teenager.

‘He came to visit at our house one day and he was talking to my mother. And he told me that they were starting a youth group, and he invited me to come. I told him that I didn’t really believe in Jesus, so I didn’t want to come to the youth group.

‘My mother was so embarrassed. And she was so angry with me. But your father just smiled. That’s okay, he said. You think about it, and if you want to attend, we’d love to have you. He didn’t get upset. And he didn’t tell me I was wrong to think that way. I’ll always remember that.

‘And then later I went to the youth group and it was great. But I’ll always remember the way he reacted.’

“Dad died four years ago today. And the truth is that although I loved him dearly, and told him so, I did not adequately appreciate his gifts as a pastor.

“When the great theologian Karl Barth was asked to sum up his many complex volumes of *Church Dogmatics*, he said,

*Jesu liebt mich, ganz gewiss,
Denn die Bibel sagt mir dies*

‘Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tells me so.’

“That would also have summarized Dad’s theology, although it sounded much more profound coming from Barth. Dad was not a theologian, but he was a pastor, and he understood the practical application of the faith.

“He was convinced that ‘God was in Christ, reconciling the world to Himself.’ And he was convinced that God’s grace, in Christ, extended to everyone, whether they believed it or not. Sadly, Dad’s intuitive response to a questioning teen made a lasting impression in part because it was not what she expected from those who call themselves Christians.

“In Paul’s exposition of Christ as the New Adam, his basic assertion is that in Adam we have all sinned and in Christ we have all been justified (forgiven and made right with God).

“For two thousand years, the majority interpretation of that passage has been that the first ‘all’ refers to everyone (everyone has sinned) and the second ‘all’ refers only to baptized Christian believers (all baptized believers have been justified).

“Ironically, this notion that sin is unlimited while grace is restricted, is one more evidence of our tendency to ‘sin’ in our biblical interpretation. So (ironically) it proves the first of Paul’s assertions. We are all self-centered and we want to believe that grace applies only to us and to the people who think like us. We believe in sin, but we have doubts about grace.

“Why is that? In traditional language, it’s because we are ‘sinners.’ Paul told the Romans that grace was greater than sin, but many Christians have trouble believing that. Our (sinful) tendency is to believe that sin is greater than grace.

“But Dad had it right.”

Thanks, Bill, for remembering your dad, Ed. He is a great reminder of Paul’s words, “but where sin increased, grace abounded all the more.” (Romans 5:20b)

CCUMC Refinances Its Mortgage

CCUMC’s mortgage came due in November of 2008 at the height of our country’s financial crisis. Accordingly, when we refinanced our mortgage we got a 6.97% interest rate. Today, rates are a lot lower. Last fall, Parke Brewer was talking with his neighbor (a banker) who verbally offered to refinance our church mortgage at 6%. The Trustees asked me to look into the possibility. After talking with Parke’s neighbor as well as going back to our current mortgage holder (SunTrust), we were able to negotiate a new mortgage with SunTrust at 5.25%, due in 5 years, with payments calculated on an 18 year amortization. The new mortgage was approved by the Trustees and signed on December 30, 2010. The amount of the mortgage is \$242,069. Two years ago, our balance was \$298,677. If all we had done was to make our standard monthly payment, our balance would have been \$282,072. But because church members have also been giving money to help pay down the mortgage, our balance was \$40,000 lower. Thanks to everyone who helped with paying down the mortgage, to Sam Bryson for his articles in Highlights raising awareness of the benefit of paying down the mortgage, and to those that helped with this refinance effort.



Katie Schechter will be leading a six-week Lenten study that will meet at the church on Sundays at 7:00 p.m. beginning March 13th and running through April 17th. 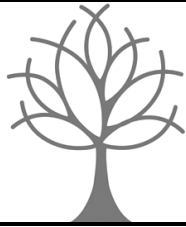

OK, so no one wanted to see a stake in the heart of 2010 more than I did. I was trying to stay upbeat about Christmas without Patti and give our girls some new traditions that would still bring joy to our season, even without their mom, whom we all missed so much. But mostly it was me acting as if ... Not really living the spirit. The quicker I could put this year behind me the better.

One of my close friends Rick, who didn't want me to be alone on New Year's, invited me and another of our good friends over for dinner that night. Now Rick's son, Brandon, had a difficult year in 2010 by any measure. He's 7 years old and has suffered from a rare immunity disease since birth that seems to perplex doctors around the country and the world. Rick and his wife have an indefatigable spirit and have gone to great lengths to have him seen by specialists in every corner of the country. Despite that, Brandon can't be around too many germs, so he doesn't go to school with other kids and is frequently taken to the hospital due to his condition. I guess he was probably in the hospital 12-15 times last year alone. So I was looking forward to playing games with Brandon and hearing his stories as we ate dinner. He enjoyed having company and an audience as we played his fun games. I was even losing my inward looking 'let's feel sorry for Paul' feeling as the night went on.

As we neared Brandon's bedtime, I said, "On New Year's, we look back at the year that's just gone and try to remember the best time and worst time. Do those times come to your mind?" "Oh," Brandon said, "there were two equally good times that I can't choose between. There was when I met the President in the Oval Office and when I met Secretary of State Hilary Clinton in her office." You see, due to circumstances that aren't relevant to this story, but mainly due to his unforgettable personality, Brandon indeed met two of the most important people in our country and showed us a picture of him and the President in the Oval Office signed: "Brandon, you're a very special boy. Barack Obama"

"Yes," I agreed, "those are very wonderful memories for this year. Now, what was the worst thing that happened in 2010?" He didn't hesitate - "Nothing" was all he said. He meant it. Excerpts from Rev. Myers Annual Report for the 2010

I want to begin with a word of thanks. I do not express my profound gratitude for this often enough. I am in the midst of my 38th year of ministry. At the end of June I will have completed 4 years as pastor of the church. I have felt enormously privileged and blessed by God to be your pastor, to work with you, to be blessed by your commitment, your willingness to grow. I have also been blessed by working with an incredibly talented staff that remains focused on our cooperative effort to our mission and vision:

"Journey Outside Yourself." We are a Christian community on a journey outside ourselves. We serve and are served, heal and are healed, through God's transforming love.

To all who are members and/or support this church, “Thank you!” I look forward to being your pastor for several more years.

Now I would like to focus on some of the accomplishments of 2010; and they have been “legion.” These are not necessarily my accomplishments, but those of the entire church.

- ◆ After the Budget Alignment Task Force identified fiscal issues for us, we reduced a projected \$220,000 deficit by close to half of that – and had we not had to address so many capital repair issues with our HVAC system, the deficit would be lower.
 - ◆ We were able to unanimously vote a budget for 2011 that reduces that deficit to about \$80,000.
 - ◆ Our stewardship program for 2011 yielded the greatest gains we have seen in many years. We project pledging to be up about \$26,000 and unpledged contributions to be up an additional \$50,000.
 - ◆ We have refinanced our mortgage, reducing the interest from almost 7% to 5.25%. At the same time a group of very dedicated people have pre-paid on the mortgage principal so that it is below \$250,000, an effective reduction of about \$40,000.
 - ◆ We have reordered our endowment to provide us with about \$60,000 of income instead of the approximately \$30,000 we used to receive on dividends alone. (We now take 6% of total value based on a 3-year rolling average.) Thanks to a healthy stock market in 2010, our endowment continues to grow, even after the income has been taken.
 - ◆ Average attendance has grown. While not necessarily spectacular in terms of numbers, when one factors in both an unusually large number of deaths and people moving away in this past year, steady growth is important.

- ◆ Of particular note, despite a severe decline in attendance at the Traditional Service in the first 6-8 months, attendance rebounded in this service in the fall and winter.
 - ◆ Our missions program continues to grow as we journey with others throughout the world.
 - ◆ We have developed a youth council and now have youth representation on several committees, most appreciably the Church Council.
 - ◆ We have undertaken a study of what it means to be a “Reconciling Church.” From this we are learning that this is not just a matter of advocacy for the gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender community, but also a core issue for this church on our understanding of this issue in context with the Bible and how and whom do we welcome.
 - ◆ Our “Christian Caregivers” program is more focused and grows both in need and, equally as importantly, in people willing to serve.
 - ◆ Hospitality and Membership continues to focus on fulfilling the Judeo-Christian mandate of hospitality. Much of our growth can be attributed to the many people who work hard at this.
 - ◆ The Traditional Worship Committee has been working hard to examine how to revitalize this service so that “extravagant” worship is proclaimed every Sunday. One major step will be moving the time of this service to 10:00 a.m. enabling parents with young children to have their children in Sunday School so the parents may worship at the Service style of their choice. This is to begin on the first Sunday in March.

I especially want to conclude with a word of thanks to the Staff – Carol, Henry, Jess, Maura, Cindy, Mary Kay, Linda, Megan and Katie; our office volunteers – Janet, Charlie, Esther, Nancy, and Margaret; and also Lee and Lauren from the Preschool Office. They make my “difficult” commute and the daily coming to this church a most enjoyable and pleasant experience.


