June Worship at Chevy Chase UMC

- June 5: **Communion; Ascension Sunday - Sermon: "Some Final Instructions."** Scripture: Acts 1:1-11 and Luke 24:22-53. This morning our Scripture gives us two versions by the same author of the resurrected Christ's final appearance on earth before Christ ascends into heaven. In both of these passages Jesus gives us some "final" instructions.
- June 12: **ONE WORSHIP SERVICE ONLY - 10:00 a.m. ALL-CHURCH PICNIC FOLLOWING Pentecost Sunday and Youth Sunday. One combined service in the Sanctuary at 10:00 a.m., followed by an All-Church Picnic.**
Sermon: "Being an Incurable Child." Scripture: Matthew 19:13-15 and Matthew 18:1-6. James Russell Lowell, passing a building which bore the inscription "Home for Incurable Children," made a comment to his companion, "They'll get me in there some day." Jesus reminded us that "unless you change and become like children, you will never enter the Kingdom of Heaven." (Mt. 18:3) This morning we will have a chance to see what Lowell meant and Jesus warns us about!
- June 19: **Trinity Sunday. Sermon: "Keeping Up."** Scripture Lesson: Matthew 28:16-20. It began at the Christ's Ascension recorded in Acts 1 – Jesus told the disciples to go and be witnesses – even to the ends of the earth. At the end of Matthew's Gospel, Jesus tells the disciples to "Go . . . and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them, . . . and teaching them." It's hard to keep up with God and God's Spirit.
- June 26: Carol Armstrong Moore preaching. **Sermon: "Out on a Limb."** Scripture: Luke 19:1-10. Zacchaeus was a chief tax collector who climbed up a tree just to catch a glimpse of Jesus as he passed through Jericho. Next thing Zacchaeus knew, Jesus was a guest in his home and his life was turned upside down.

MYERS' MUSINGS



June, 2011

“Truly I tell you, unless you change and become like children, you will never enter the Kingdom of Heaven.” . . . Matthew 18:3

When I was 5, I wanted to grow up. After I rode a bus from Bangor, Maine, to Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, at age 8, I wanted to be a bus driver when I grew up. Last week on the golf course, when one of my playing partners crushed a long drive over 300 yards, I jokingly said to my teammate, “When I grow up, I want to be like him.”

Some of you might observe that I never set the bar very high.

But the common thread of all the above examples is that I always wanted to grow up! Perhaps a brief summary of your life story is that way too.

And then comes Jesus; always confounding us, trying to turn our world upside down. He said these words in the 18th chapter of Matthew, “Unless you change and become like children, you will never enter the Kingdom of Heaven.” And I always thought that getting to heaven was the most grown-up thing you could achieve.

And that’s the problem. Achieving the Kingdom of Heaven isn’t possible! It comes by grace – a free gift – both undeserved and unearned. There is nothing we can do to earn it – no amount of prayer, no amount of study. It is a gift; no strings attached. Paul Tillich wrote a great chapter in a book called The Shaking of the Foundations. The chapter is titled “You Are Accepted.” In it Tillich talks about grace and God’s realm. Tillich writes:

Sometimes at that moment a wave of light breaks into our darkness, and it is though a voice were saying: “You are accepted. *You are accepted*, accepted by that which is greater than you, and the name of which you do not know. Do not ask for that name now; perhaps you will find it later. Do not try to do anything now; perhaps later you will do much. Do not seek for anything; do not perform anything; do not intend anything. *Simply accept the fact that you are accepted!*” (The Shaking of the Foundations, p. 162)

And then I remember my children, Nate and Sarah, and the delight of them growing up. Their pure joy when they played with others, their innocent understanding that the world was all right, that they were safe, and most of all that they knew that they were loved.

Could it be that they knew then – as children – what God’s grace was all about? Is that what Jesus meant when He told us that to enter the Kingdom of Heaven we must become like children? I had moments like that when I was a child; it’s a shame that in the process of “growing up” I had to unlearn that acceptance and face a world that tells us everything – jobs, grades, reputations, and in many instances, even friends – must be earned!

Join us on June 12th – it is Youth Sunday – one service at 10:00 a.m., followed by a picnic. Picnics are a good time to experience the joy of youth – and grace!

Nicaragua Trip *August 2 – 12, 2011*

On Tuesday morning, August 2, 2011, some of the members of Chevy Chase UMC will depart to visit Nicaragua for 10 days, and in particular our Mission Partners there. While there the group will be fulfilling our Vision and Mission statement that states: “We serve and are served, we heal and are healed through God’s transforming love.”

Our trip will have several components including:

- ◆ Spend time living with families of our **Sister Church in Barrio Nuevo** and working with their Pre-School. We will also worship with them on Sunday, August 7th.
- ◆ Working with **Drs. Lizzett and Deborah Cortez in their dental program**. This will take us to two of the schools and communities they work with.
- ◆ Working with **Accion Medica Cristiana**, the indigenous preventive medical agency where Dr. Belinda Forbes and her husband, Gerardo, work. This will hopefully send us back to New Jerusalem in the mountainous area of Central Nicaragua to help further establish the community there. (Previously we planted pine trees along the road to prevent erosion, and last year we planted over 200 cocoa trees along the stream bank.)
- ◆ If possible, visit some of the **programs of Nan McCurdy and Miguel**, missionaries we support in Nicaragua. They develop and guide programs primarily benefitting children and women. (When we are in Nicaragua, Nan and Miguel will be in the U.S. on their required itineration as missionaries.)
- ◆ **Visiting Martin Luther King, Jr. University** to see the work of this private (but cheaper than public) university that graduates about 60-65% women!
- ◆ Wonderful sights and experience: an active volcano, swim in a volcanic lake, have an opportunity to do a zip line, perhaps visit an organic coffee plantation, visit a Nicaraguan musical event, and much more. And you will have time for shopping and to buy gifts and souvenirs.

How you can be a part of the trip even if you can’t go! As always we will be taking toothbrushes and medical supplies with us, as well as pre-school supplies. You can help by contributing the following:

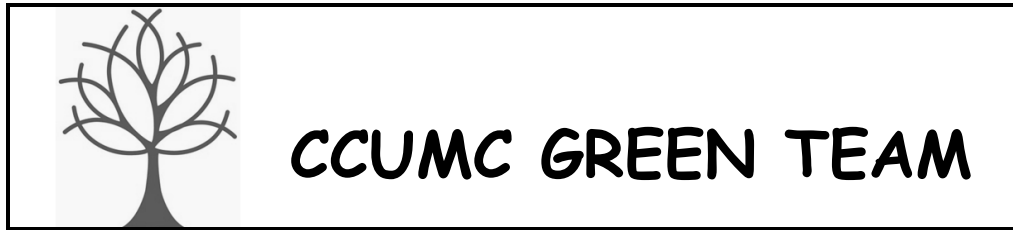
Individually wrapped toothbrushes

School supplies (not paper) – markers, Spanish children’s books, picture books

Hand puppets

Over-the-counter medical supplies for children and adults. (Especially important are triple antibiotics, pain relievers, cold and asthma supplies, medical tape and bandages, hemorrhoid treatments, antacid, etc.)

TRASH DISPOSAL THE DISTRICT VS. MONTGOMERY COUNTY

Most of us don't think about trash once we toss it away. But not all trash is disposed of properly, and some trash is harmful to the environment. Styrofoam (the petroleum derived polystyrene), for example, does not biodegrade. As trash or litter, it becomes a permanent fixture in landfills and a pollutant in our waterways and oceans. Styrofoam and other plastics are frequently ingested by marine life. In some parts of the Pacific Ocean, plastic particles outnumber zooplankton. Did you know that our oceans are becoming the world's largest garbage dump?

The District uses a combination of waste incineration and landfills. However, this means that Styrofoam, along with many other non-biodegradable materials collected in the District, end up in landfills. Landfills cannot remain a permanent solution as the population increases and people generate more and more trash per person.

Fortunately, Montgomery County incinerates all trash (that is not recycled), including Styrofoam. In Montgomery County incineration eliminates 90% of the solid waste that would go to landfills. However, most U.S. communities do not have up-to-date trash disposal. In most of the world, garbage is a huge environmental problem. As good stewards of the planet, it is best to be mindful that Styrofoam and other non-biodegradable, non-recyclable products, remain a threat to our environment and whenever possible stop using these products.

If you care, be aware. Consider alternatives to non-biodegradable products wherever you live, work, or travel. Every individual can make a difference. Think about what you purchase and how it will be disposed of before you toss it away. **Remember the three Rs – Reduce, Reuse, Recycle.**

Recycling Collection Project – Small Electronics

J-O-Y IN SRI LANKA

“The day the tsunami hit, first the water rushed away from the shore. Some rushed out with sticks to mark out what would be their land. But then the waves came back in, four of them, washing away their hopes and claiming their lives.” This tragic story, told to us by a survivor of that 2004 tsunami that killed 30,000 people, explained the memorial on that beach in eastern Sri Lanka. But not far along the shore we saw new houses built by “Back to Life,” and people rebuilding their lives. What were we doing in Sri Lanka? One of the reasons was to volunteer with Y GRO, a mission supported by our church helping other people rebuild their lives from a man-made disaster.

Y GRO (Growth of Youth: economic, social, psychological, and spiritual)

In his very effective presentation to our Friendship Class last year, Chandran Williams described many of Y GRO’s projects. It seemed clear that these were also directed toward growth of families and communities from the aftermath of a brutal civil war. Tamils in the north, a minority with their own language and culture and mostly Hindus, wanted to be independent from the Sinhalese who are mostly Buddhist. The 26-year war finally ended two years ago with over 300,000 civilian refugees in the north.

In Colombo, the capital in the south, Chandran gave us an update on the project our church supports: Math Education Programs in Jaffna and Mannar in the north. Our funds help students prepare for university or learn vocational math. Talking with Chandran and learning about their other projects gave a strong feeling of how worthwhile and exciting was the work, and how dedicated and spiritual was Chandran. So very humbling for us. However, it was inadvisable for us to volunteer with Y GRO, and instead we were led to a new opportunity with Sarvodaya.

Sarvodaya (Awakening of All)

Founded in 1958 on Buddhist and Gandhian principles, Sarvodaya is an organization involved in community development, relief and rehabilitation, peace-building, and conflict reconciliation. Its founder, Dr. A. T. Ariyaratne, held several peace conferences during the war and has been credited with having a large part in restoring peace. We stayed in a hostel in their headquarters complex south of Colombo where Buddhists, Tamils, Hindus, Muslims, and Christians all work and live together. At their New Year's celebrations we were invited to join Dr. Ariyaratne and his wife in lighting candles for the Buddhist and then the Tamil Hindu shrines. We witnessed firsthand how they practiced their philosophy of respecting everyone: they certainly "practice what they preach." Watching closely how they interacted in games and several conversations, including children, was a real lesson in how our world should be.

Elders' Home

For one week we were part of the lives of 23 older women in various stages of physical and mental shape. They were all so sweet, and fortunately two spoke English. Both of us gave upper body and head massages which were a big hit, participated in exercises, tossed a ball, and played card games. But often we just sat and held hands (particularly with blind Rosa) and "talked." It was a sentimental farewell for all of us.

Abandoned Children's Home

Oh, the week with the abandoned children! Know anyone who wants to adopt? We have the child/children for them. Imagine opening a gate at 9:00 a.m. and having some twenty 2 to 3 year olds running to greet you with loud cheering and open arms. At times we would have four in our lap, one at each side, and two behind. They lapped up affection as a sponge soaks up water. Thankfully the children did not know about our last day, because it was extremely hard for us with many tears.

This was our recent J-O-Y and some of our joys in Sri Lanka.

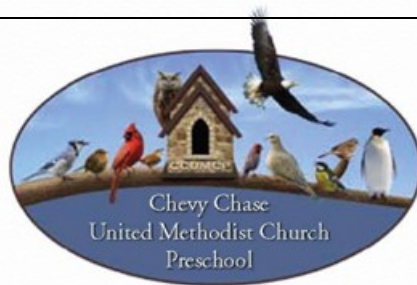
HOST HOMES NEEDED
