Continuation of Five-Part Sermon Series on the Lord's Prayer (Parts 3 – 5)

- March 6:** Transfiguration Sunday. The Sacrament of Communion. Sermon: “The Prayer of Jesus: Give Us This Day Our Daily Bread,” based on Genesis 1: 26-31 and Matthew 6:5-13. In Genesis God gave humans “dominion” over the earth. That means we should act as God would care for the earth. I have travelled to some countries where the petition “give us this day our daily bread” means a prayer to have food to eat. In other countries, might this same petition be limiting – as in – give us only enough to be satisfied?
- March 9:** 7:00 p.m. Ash Wednesday Service, held in the Chapel. A contemplative service of prayer and introduction to Lenten Discipline.
- March 13:** Sermon: “The Prayer of Jesus: The Suffering of God,” based on Hosea 14:1-7 and Matthew 6:5-13. True forgiveness is transforming – especially for the one doing the forgiving. In this petition of the Lord’s Prayer we examine the double-sided petition, “forgive us **our** sins **as we forgive** those who sin against us.”
- March 20:** Sermon: “The Prayer of Jesus: Deliverance,” based on Matthew 6:5-13. The last petition in the prayer that Jesus taught is “And lead us not into the time of trial, and do not put us to the test.” As a student I dreaded tests – especially when I was not as prepared as I should have been. This petition, however, is not that we should live in a sterile environment where we are not tested in any way. Rather this is a petition that God not put us to the test. The petition is also that God deliver us from evil. It is hard to eradicate evil from our lives, and perhaps that is why we pray to God to be delivered from evil’s ultimate power – a power that Christ’s resurrection overcame.
- March 27:** Sermon: “The Holy Lands Come Alive.” A sermon of pictures, words, and memories from the land that we call holy. Pictures taken in various locations of the Chevy Chase Pilgrims to the Holy Land, January 25-February 4, 2011, will be shared.

MYERS' MUSINGS



March, 2011

Blessed are the peacemakers for they shall be called children of God. Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven." . . . Matthew 5:9-10

Twenty plus members of our church and several new friends spent 10 days traveling to or in Jordan and Israel from January 25th to February 4th. The day we departed, protests began in Tehrir (which means liberation) Square in Cairo, Egypt, the very place we were to be on February 9th. Needless to say, the revolution in Egypt provided a constant overtone to our trip. There were many times when the protests became prominent – when we were informed that Educational Opportunities was making alternate travel plans in case they had to cancel the Egypt portion of our trip, when the final cancellation of the Egypt portion of the trip occurred, and especially when our Jordanian guide spoke some heartfelt words (who also happened to be a journalist for the Turkish News Agency).

But there was another instance when the protest became prominent for me – when we came to the Chapel called Mount Beatitudes on a hill overlooking the northern shore of the Sea of Galilee.



One of the Beatitudes, is “Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God.” Followed by, “Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness’ sake, for theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven.” Each of the Beatitudes were inscribed in a stained glass window.

Jesus gave the Sermon on the Mount in this very peaceful, pastoral, and serene place. And yet always present when Jesus spoke was the fact that the Jews were oppressed and controlled by the Roman Empire. So even as Jesus spoke the words that would become some of our most comforting prayers and thoughts, Jesus asked us to pray for both peacemakers and those persecuted for righteousness.

As we were there in that beautiful Chapel, I prayed silent prayers for those in our own time who are trying to bring peace to a land where peace is an elusive goal; and also to those who are being persecuted for righteousness sake. Certainly my prayers were for the Egyptians, who after 30 years of Marshall Law decided enough was enough, and relatively peacefully overturned an oppressive regime where 60% of the population lives on less than \$2.00 a day. But my prayers were also for Palestinian Christians who once dominated a land called Palestine, but now are less than 2% of the population of Israel and live (along with all other Palestinians) in their land where they are constantly reminded of the disparity of freedom and restriction by a 27 foot wall that restricts their movement and jobs.

And today I ask you to pray with me. . . "Thy Kingdom come, on earth as it is in heaven."

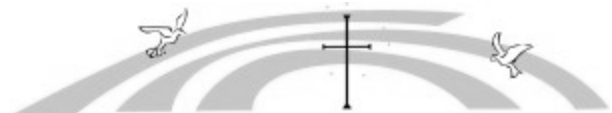

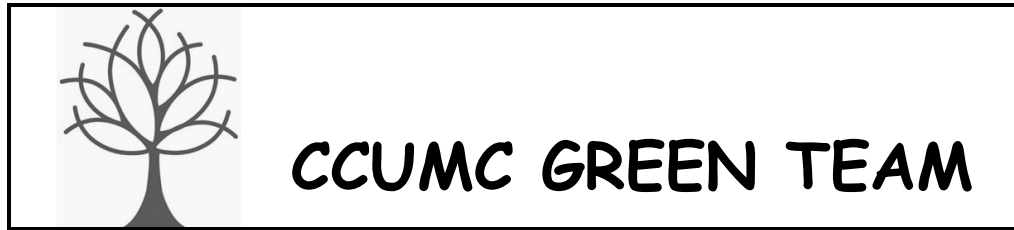

Trash Disposal

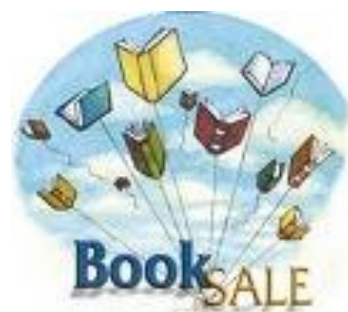
Montgomery County and the District

Most of us don't think about our trash after we toss it into a bin. But not all trash is disposed of properly, and some trash is harmful to the environment. It is common knowledge that the polymer, Styrofoam, a petroleum derived polystyrene, will not biodegrade in our lifetime. It is not recyclable. As trash or as litter, it becomes a permanent fixture in landfills and a pollutant in our waterways and oceans. Fortunately, Montgomery County has no landfills, and all trash (including Styrofoam) that is not recycled is incinerated. Incineration eliminates 90% of the solid waste that would go to landfills. The leftover ash is used as dirt fill and road aggregate.

Waste disposal in the District and other communities, however, is handled differently. Along with recycling, DC uses a combination of incineration and landfills. For many reasons, landfills are bad for the environment. But we, as a nation, are producing more trash per person than ever before, requiring the need for more landfills. Although it is impossible to know the disposal methods of each community we visit, it is best to assume that use of Styrofoam remains a threat to our environment, whether in the manufacture or disposal of the product. **If you care, be aware.** Consider alternatives to Styrofoam products wherever you live, work, or travel. It's a small step in the right direction.

A BRIEF ACCOUNT OF ONE PERSON'S *JOURNEY OUTSIDE YOURSELF*

On Monday, January 24th, Mary Alice Gray read an article in the Metro Section of The Washington Post entitled “A New Page for a Strapped Library.” It rekindled her memory of a book she had recently read entitled, “A Hope in the Unseen: An American Odyssey from the Inner City to the Ivy League.” which described the escape from hopelessness of a challenged Ballou student named Cedric Jennings.

The Washington Post article by Bill Turque didn't mention Cedric Jennings. Rather, it focused on the sad state of Ballou High School's library and the efforts of Melissa Jackson, a dynamic teacher-librarian, to turn a student-described “hot mess” into an oasis at the troubled 1,200-student D.C. high school in the heart of Anacostia. The entire Ballou library totaled 1,185 books — barely one book per student. Eleven books per student is the accepted standard. Not only poorly equipped, the library was a dismal, uninviting place. Melissa Jackson's commitment, supported strongly by her Principal Rahman Branch, is to turn all this around.

The Post article got to Mary Alice as a mother, grandmother, and former teacher. Journeying outside herself, she contacted Ms. Jackson by e-mail asking for the list of books needed. Her e-mail ended this way: “Your new best friend, Mary Alice.” Melissa Jackson replied with the reading list and the promise of hugs with the book delivery.

Armed with the list of books needed, Mary Alice began soliciting help from friends far and wide. Responses came from CCUMC's Library Study Group members, UMW, Potpourri, neighborhood friends, and a host of others. One friend, unable to provide any books, wrote a check for \$100. Another person, unknown to Mary Alice prior to this outreach, dropped off several books she had purchased used from a Montgomery County Public Library, benefitting both the public library and Ballou High School.



With 96 hard and soft cover books stuffed into five shopping bags, on February 9th Mary Alice drove the 14 miles to Ballou to deliver the fruits of this *Journey Outside Yourself* to a gracious and grateful Melissa Jackson full of hugs.
